

It's that time again -- time for us all to gather together for a few fall days to share, learn, and connect in the name of that which is our common purpose: the preservation of our moving image heritage. The Board of Directors and the Conference Committee of the Association of Moving Image Archivists welcomes you to our thirteenth annual conference, headquartered in the charming and friendly city of Vancouver, British Columbia.

The year 2003 will be the first time this century that AMIA has ventured north to hold its conference in Canada. The last Canadian conference was held in 1999 in Montreal, Quebec. As we did in Montreal, AMIA again is dedicating a substantial portion of its program to exploring Canada's moving image community in all of its complexities. Our plenary session surveys Canada's documentary film tradition, featuring as special guests three of the genre's most accomplished image makers, Stan Fox, Allan King, and Alanis Obomsawin. Images of indigenous peoples-including Canada's First Nations peoples-and their preservation will be the focus of a four and a half hour session and screening program taking place at Pacific Cinematheque.

This special event, "Creating, Collecting, Preserving and Presenting Moving Images of Indigenous Peoples: A Dialogue" is significant for several reasons. It originated from four separate session proposals received by the Conference Committee: a clear indication of the demand among AMIA members for a dialogue of this kind. Painstakingly put together by four different groups within the Association and valiantly organized by Conference Committee member Wendy Shay, this event represents the first such coordinated effort. "Creating, Collecting, Preserving and Presenting Moving Images of Indigenous Peoples: A Dialogue" is also one of two sessions being hosted at a facility other than the conference hotel, Pacific Cinematheque. As AMIA grows, increasingly we find ourselves in the position of needing to hold events at outside venues that can accommodate our numbers. We hope that you will enjoy the Cinematheque, a Vancouver treasure, and will let us know how you think our first experiments with off-site session venues went.

As in past years, the AMIA conference program was developed from member submissions and illuminates the diversity of our members' work and concerns. No matter what your particular background is-digital archivist, preservation technician, film historian, or television cataloger, to name only a few-the conference promises to offer something to suit your fancy!

Enjoy the conference, and enjoy the wonderful, walkable city of Vancouver! We wish you a most inspired and fruitful week.

MIC is an AMIA-Library of Congress collaboration, with major funding from the National Science Foundation.

Discussion will focus on the functions of catalogs, current conceptual models, and traditional standards such as MARC 21 Formats for Bibliographic, Authority, and Holdings Data and accompanying code lists; Archival Moving Image Materials: A Cataloging manual, 2nd ed. (AMIM2); Anglo-American Cataloging Rules, 2nd ed. revised (AACR2r); Library of Congress Rule Interpretations (LCRIs); the Name Authority File (NAF); Library of Congress Subject Headings (LCSH) and Subject Cataloging Manual: Subject Headings; the Moving Image Genre and Form Guide (MIGFG); and Moving Image Materials: Genre Terms (MIM).



It is directed toward those wishing to build a strong metadata program, both inexperienced newcomers without a program and experienced archivists with an existing program who want to see how and why Dublin Core and MPEG-7 extend and complement their current efforts. This hands-on training will utilize the MIC/ViDe Application Profile for Dublin Core and MPEG-7 (http://gondolin.rutgers.edu/MIC/text/how/ cataloging utility.htm). This Application Profile serves as a Cataloging Utility for the Moving Image Collections (MIC) portal, building both DC and MPEG-7 records from a single schema input in a Microsoft Access database. In addition, the workshop will provide an introduction to digital rights metadata as compared with descriptive metadata in relation to providing access to moving images.

Canadian cinema and television in French and English long has been celebrated for its living tradition of engaged documentary filmmaking. The National Film Board and the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation provided opportunities for young film artists whose social consciences and passionate searches for meaning led to committed programming and technological innovation that radically altered the nature of documentary, influencing filmmakers all around the world. This opening plenary, moderated by Colin Browne, will bring together pioneers of new forms of documentary: Allan King and Stan Fox; a current filmmaker who is pushing the boundaries: Alanis Obomsawin; and an historian of the process: Laurie Jones, Director, Communications and Outreach Development of the National Film Board.

AMIA extends its deepest thanks to the National Film Board, the AV Preservation Trust.ca, and the Audio-Visual Heritage Association of British Columbia for its assistance in making this plenary session possible.

For many audio-visual archives and researchers, the problem of access is not negotiating with rights holders, but simply locating them. At present, there does not seem to be a shared standard or consensus concerning access for material with unlocateable rights holders. Furthermore, existing risk assessment procedures used by archives tend to be ad-hoc and informal, reflecting the needs of the institution that created them. As moving images are increasingly distributed in digital formats and must be managed in accordance with copyright laws and business requirements, finding the means to control access and use of digital files has become an important consideration. While digital rights management applications are in development and use in broadcasting and web distribution, the topic is only just beginning to be addressed by the educational and non-profit communities. This session will provide an overview of recent changes in copyright law impacting digital works and mechanisms used in applying digital rights management: rights metadata standards, rights expression languages, and content protection technologies. 

Over the last several years, there has been an increase in the number of educational opportunities for people interested in moving image archiving and preservation. All archives have to balance conflicting demands for preservation and access. Archives with limited resources face these pressures a little more intensely. There are fewer staff members to deploy and fewer dollars to buy outside services. In many countries there are severe restrictions on foreign exchange that prevent the purchase of equipment and supplies. Management principles for moving image archives remain the same for "rich" and "poor" archives, but practice needs to be adapted to operational realities. To provide an international perspective, speakers from archives in several countries will describe how they carry out their mission, finding imaginative approaches to storage under less than ideal conditions, technical and intellectual processing, and public service with basic viewing equipment.

Preserving the Authenticity of Digital Records: Moving Images and the InterPARES Project

The InterPARES Project began in 1999 with the purpose of developing the theoretical and methodological knowledge essential to the permanent preservation of authentic digital records and to formulate model policies, strategies, and standards capable of ensuring that preservation. Its first phase, which was concluded in 2001, produced requirements and methods for the creation, maintenance, selection, and preservation of authentic digital records, mostly generated in the course of administrative activities. The second phase, which began in 2002, studies records created in the course of artistic, scientific, and e-government activities. Moving images are therefore a primary focus of the on-going research, which involves specialists from the film and computer industries, archivists, and film scholars. This session will present the findings of the first phase of InterPARES that are relevant to the preservation of the authenticity of digital moving images and will describe case studies that are being carried out in the second phase to meet the challenge of the authentic preservation of digital moving image records.

Concluding the presentation will be a report on the status of "The National Film Preservation Act of 2003," legislation to extend federal funding for the National Film Preservation Board and Foundation. 





May 1924: In the opening scene of the feature film Policing the Plains, the symbolic figure of "Britannia" (Margaret Lougheed) appears on the steps of the Vancouver Court House (now the Vancouver Art Gallery) to give her benediction to a mounted squad from the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. Policing the Plains (1924-1927), a dramatized history of the RCMP, was written, produced, directed and photographed by pioneer Vancouver cinematographer A.D. "Cowboy" Kean (1882-1961). It was the first Canadian feature film made in British Columbia. After spending over three years shooting in B.C., Alberta, and Ontario, Kean premiered his epic at Toronto's Royal Alexandra Theatre for a week in December 1927. He was unable to secure wider distribution, however, and the original negative and projection print languished in a film vault for at least ten years before disappearing altogether. Only the production stills survive.
